VI. Course Description Through a review of the relevant provisions of the Kyrgyz

legislation and international conventions, the course covers basic principles of protection of intellectual property objects. The course will highlight two major areas of intellectual property law, namely, industrial property and copyright and related rights. Recent legislative developments in the area of intellectual property law at the European Union, United States and international level will also be examined. Issues of enforcing intellectual property rights in developing countries will be discussed, as well as issues of impact

of digital technologies on intellectual property law.

VII. Teaching Method The method of teaching combines both theoretical and practical

parts. Theoretical information shall be followed by practical assignments in class and at home. Students shall be required to do specific amount of reading for each class, as well as to engage in

practical group and individual assignments.

X. Evaluation Criteria

The course's rationale is based on subject matters of intellectual property law. Every block on IP subject matter is followed by a seminar, where students will discuss the most urgent issues of intellectual property law in the class or with representatives of intellectual property community. Every block may be followed by assignment in the form of Problem Set/Quiz and Group Assignment. Students will be requested to write Final Research Paper on the selected topics.

Criteria for evaluation of Problem Set/Quiz, Group Assignment, Presentation and Final Research Paper shall be as follows:

Students are required to bring texts of relevant national laws and international legislation in intellectual property area to the respective class block (e.g. Copyright Law classes will require students to have Civil Code and Law of the Kyrgyz Republic "On Copyright and Related Rights", as well as certain international conventions, such as, Berne Convention for Protection of Literary and Artistic Works, WIPO Copyright Treaty, WIPO Performance and Phonogram Treaty, and etc. during the duration of the copyright law block).
