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# **Description**

This course is required by both the Ministry of Education in Kyrgyzstan and BardCollege. You have to pass this course in order to get a Kyrgyz diploma. The study of history is also central to a liberal arts education because history teaches critical thinking, persuasive writing and the cause and effect relation. You have to pass this course to get a Bard accredited degree as well.

Another requirement for receiving a Kyrgyz diploma is to pass the state exam on the History of Kyrgyzstan. This course does not aim to prepare students for the state exam. You may attend review sessions which are scheduled two months prior to the state exam on the History of Kyrgyzstan in May. Nevertheless, this course will cover all material that is required by the state exam.

This course intends to teach students the basics of historical research, the use of primary and secondary sources, analytical thinking and reasoning within the framework of the history of Kyrgyzstan and Central Asia.

Most of reading materials are primary sources. All reading materials will be available on the e-courseon History of Kyrgyzstan (Chotaeva). Students will have an access to the e-course.

# **Assignments/Assessment**

#### Attendance - 10%

Attendance is required. Attendance will be checked in the beginning of each class period. If you are late you will not be allowed to the class. Each unexcused absence will reduce your attendance grade by 2%. If you got sick, you have to notify an instructor or the office manager in advance, and later submit an official document (spravka) from a physician, especially if you are supposed to make a class presentation or submit a written assignment. *Five unexcused absences* will result in "F" for the whole course.

#### Participation – 30%

Participation means more than good attendance. It means to contribute actively to seminar class discussions and writings. You must be prepared to discuss and write on course readings during a seminar class the as listed on the schedule. **Bring your note-book to each seminar class!** 

#### Class Presentation – 15%

You have to sign up for a topic of the course in the presentations' list provided by an instructor to make a group or individual presentation during a seminar class. Not more than two students could sign up for a topic. You have to choose your topic and make presentation according to the criteria provided by the instructor and available in the e-course. If you fail to make a class presentation on time, you will not be given a second chance to do it and loose 15% assigned for the presentation.

#### In-Class Map Quiz – 5%

During the map quiz you have to work with the map of Central Asia and recognize specific locations on it. You will be given a number of questions you have to answer by indicating the correct place on the map provided by the instructor.

# Midterm - 25%

Midterm exam is a take-home exam. It is a reflection paper on primary historical source. In the reflection paper you should demonstrate your ability to interpret the information provided in a primary source. The criteria of how to write midterm paper are provided in the e-course. Reflection paper should be 2-3 pages, double-spaced. In case of cheating student will receive a zero for the assignment. The delayed papers are not accepted and graded.

#### Museum Essay – 15%

The museum essay is a critique paper (2 pages, double spaced) to be written following the tour to the Kyrgyz National Museum. The tour will take place during a seminar class and will be guided by the instructor. The museum essay should be written in the form of recommendations that you may suggest in order to improve the museum displays. The criteria of how to write

museum essay are provided in the e-course. In case of plagiarism student will receive a zero for the assignment. The delayed papers are not accepted and graded.
